## Richter's book on recruiting 'hits the nail on the head'

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As **Dylan Richter** navigated through the college recruiting process, it quickly became apparent landing a college scholarship entailed more than he or his family ever envisioned.

The former Stevenson High School basket-ball star (2008 graduate) found a good fit at Division III Washington University (where he's averaging 7.9 points a

"When you go
through the process, you
realize no one is in
charge," the Lincolnshire
resident said. "You have
to find out what to do on
your own.

"We had a pretty successful outcome,"
Richter added. "But
we've talked to so many
people who got stuck (at
schools the athlete didn't
like). It (recruiting) is a
horrible process for parents, and every year
thousands of people go
through it."

Before
Richter's book
went to press,
she sought out
the opinion of
Stevenson head
basketball coach

Pat Ambrose.

"Laurie asked me to preview it," Ambrose con-

firmed. "It's fantastic. It shows she did a tremendous amount of research, and I think it hits the nail on the head."

Richter details the recruiting experiences of several area athletes (who are identified by

first name only). She also contacted college coaches — in a wide range of sports — for their views on all aspects of the process.

Put Me in Coach is full of common-sense tips for the prospective student/athlete. Here's a quick sample:

— overestimating the talent level of the athlete is a common mistake made by both the athlete and his/her parents.

- don't wait for colleges to find you; instead, contact the schools of interest yourself.
- high school coaches will help in the process, but remember the coach is also a teacher and has family commitments that take up his/her time.
- play on AAU and club teams to gauge your athlete's skill level outside the high school atmosphere.
- look into meritbased scholarships (academic achievement), as there is much more money available through that avenue than athletic scholarships.
- make sure the school of choice is attractive academically, socially and athletically.
